I think that we could all agree that the world could use some peace. Peace within each of our troubled and weary souls, and peace in our relationships with each other.

This Advent and Christmas I will be praying for that peace to come on

earth and I will be praying that I might be a part of bringing it within my relationships.

And I encourage you to do the same.

Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me.

Council Corner

Traditions old and new ...

"So then, brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter" (Thessalonians 2:15).

Traditions help communities for their own unique identity. Traditions help establish ways of observing times and seasons. Traditions also connect us to those who came before us. Yet Jesus was clear that traditions don't need to stay the same forever. We read in the Gospels about Jesus breaking the traditions of his day by healing people on the sabbath, talking to women, eating with sinners, overturning money tables in the temple, touching lepers, and teaching hearers to love both their friends and their enemies.

Jesus changed these traditions because they no longer fit what God was doing. God was doing something new and exciting. These traditions were keeping some people from experiencing God's love and presence, and they needed to change. When old traditions need to change or end, it gives us an opportunity to start new traditions – traditions that share God's love with everyone and add value to our communities.

- · Feel they're losing the church they once knew;
- Don't feel they have a voice;
- · Don't deal with change very well;
- They have a point!

Our path forward will depend on how well we work together and discuss issues when we don't understand each other and when we don't agree. We have important decisions to make as we discern what God is calling us to do – who God is calling us to be – as we begin to make future plans for the use of the former preschool space. There will be ample opportunity for all to participate in the discernment process.

Do you remember playing the "telephone" game? The one where one person whispers something into a neighbor's ear, then that message gets passed on and on and then back to the original person? Quite often, what's repeated back is not quite the same as what the original message was. So it goes with communication here at the church. We sometimes find it easier to ask a third party about what was said than to go to the source; what can happen is the message is relayed only partially, because that's what the listener focused on, and sometimes has an opinion added without clarification that it was not included in the original message. This can inadvertently lead to confusion, misunderstandings, and hurt feelings. Let's do our best to "go to the source" whenever possible.

Supporting One Another

Ascension Cancer Support Ministry

In November, we introduced the **Caregiver Care Package**. Cancer not only turns the patient's life upside-down; it also does the same thing to the caregiver. Like their loved one, they are being tested physically, emotionally and spiritually.

A caregiver wears many hats. They provide love, support and encouragement for their loved one. They are an advocate when it comes to the medical team, asking questions and getting answers. They keep track of appointments. They often take on more of the household tasks and responsibilities that their loved one can't handle at the moment. They walk a fine line of knowing when to step in and when to let their loved one be in control. They handle this and more, as they try to manage their own feelings and fears that come with a cancer diagnosis. Caregivers are inspiring. They may not see it but others do.

What I hear when talking to caregivers is that they can sometimes feel isolated and alone, and they find it hard to make time for themselves. Like with the other care packages, the caregiver package contains a devotional book and a prayer square to help them stay connected to God. The devotional is about the power of prayer and how God is there for them right where they are. In addition, we remind them to lean into family and friends and accept their love and support. Also included in the care package are items that encourages them to take a quiet moment for themselves.

The Caregiver Care Packages, Cancer Care Packages and Chemo Care Packages are located in the church office. If you know of someone facing cancer please stop by and pick one up or see Heidi or myself on Sunday mornings. Please reach out if you have any questions.
